

<u>LA CORRESPONSABILIDAD DIARIA</u> ¿Está Cristo Rey en Nuestros Corazones?

Cuando piensas en un rey, ¿quién es la primera persona que te viene a la cabeza? Puede depender de cuánta historia sepas o qué período histórico te intriga más. Como estadounidenses, la primera persona en la que podríamos pensar es en el rey Jorge III, cuyo reinado se ha convertido en sinónimo en nuestra tradición nacional del concepto de tiranía.

No estamos muy familiarizados con la realeza en la sociedad estadounidense moderna. Los reyes tienden a inquietarnos. Los presidentes, por otro lado, podemos manejar eso, porque sabemos que somos el jefe de un presidente. No importa cuánto poder tenga, nosotros somos el electorado. Somos la fuente de ese poder. Nos sentimos cómodos con este acuerdo.

Pero con los reyes es profundamente diferente. Tradicionalmente, el rey deriva su poder de Dios. Su gobierno une a la humanidad con lo divino.

Debemos reflexionar detenidamente si hemos hecho o no a Jesucristo rey en nuestro corazón, o si lo consideramos como un presidente. La diferencia no es solo de títulos, es de roles. Los súbditos no exigen nada de un rey. Ellos suplican. Ellos ruegan. Se someten y aceptan.

¿Exigimos de Cristo, o suplicamos? ¿Toleramos los edictos de Dios con quejas, o aceptamos Su palabra como el medio de nuestra reconciliación con Él?

El "buen ladrón" trató a Cristo como un rey. Su homólogo lo trató como a un presidente. Y vale la pena recordar que Jesucristo no es el presidente del Universo.

Sharing the Gospel

When the soldiers hurt Jesus, they were only doing their job. They did not understand that they were killing God's Son. Jesus saw into the hearts of those soldiers, and he forgave them. A man next to Jesus on the cross had done terrible things. He knew he deserved to die on a cross, and he was truly sorry. This criminal believed that Jesus was God's Son. Jesus saw into that criminal's heart, and Jesus forgave him, too.

Dear God, thank you for sending Jesus to forgive my sins, too.

Something to Draw

Draw a picture of Jesus on the cross.

Mission for the Week

Jesus forgave the people who killed him. He expects you to forgive people who hurt you, too. Think of one person with whom you have been angry. Ask God to help you forgive that person, because Jesus forgives you.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Is Christ King in Our Hearts?

When you think of a king, who is the first person to pops into your head? It may depend on how much history you know, or which historical period intrigues you the most. As Americans, the first person we might think of is King George III, whose reign has become synonymous in our national lore with the concept of tyranny.

We don't have much familiarity with kingship in modern American society. Kings tend to make us uneasy. Presidents, on the other hand — we can handle those, because we know we are a president's boss. No matter how much power he has, we are the electorate. We are the source of that power. We're comfortable with this arrangement.

But with kings it is profoundly different. Traditionally, the king derives his power from God. His rule bridges humanity with the divine.

We should reflect carefully on whether or not we have made Jesus Christ king in our hearts, or whether we regard him as a president. The difference isn't just one of titles, it's one of roles. Subjects do not demand anything of a king. They beseech. They entreat. They submit, and they accept.

Do we demand of Christ, or do we beseech? Do we tolerate God's edicts with grumbling, or do we embrace His word as the means of our reconciliation with Him?

The "good thief" treated Christ as a king. His counterpart treated him as a president. And it's worth remembering that Jesus Christ is not the President of the Universe.

Public Life

Ouestion:

If we have a separation of church and state, how should faith influence the way we act in society, especially for those who have a role in the government?

Answer:

No matter who we are, our inner lives affect the way we interact with the world. In the United States, we have freedom of religion. That means there is no official statesanctioned religion. This does not mean that our faith is a private affair with no impact on public life! We have the ability to freely exercise our religious beliefs in accord with our conscience. Not only do we have the option to do so, but we also have the responsibility.

We're called to imitate Christ in every area of our life, not compartmentalize our faith. This means acting with respect and honoring the common humanity all we encounter. It means recognizing the person behind the politics. It also means standing up for the truth of human life and dignity, and advocating for just policies that serve the common good. The Vatican has produced a "Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church." It contains more detailed exposition of how our Catholic faith relates to various aspects of public life.
